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Feedback indicates the 2010 NCR Annual Meeting was one of the best ever!

The NCR owes a big thank you to our conference planning committee, regional REM committee members **Jennifer Hall, Pat Thresher, Stanley Kim & Brenda Jackson**. They arranged for an excellent plenary speaker and an innovative, interactive worship experience using an artist in residence. That balanced heavy, but constructive business sessions that provided lots of discussion around proposed governance changes as both the national and regional level. Our two regional representatives will be well armed with helpful feedback from the NCR when they go to the ACPE Board meeting in early November. (Details can be found on the regional website (www.ncracpe.org) On the main page, click on “2010 Annual Meeting Reports/ Continuing Education Certificate” and then look for “Summary of NCR Discussion on ACPE Governance Proposal”.) The discussion resulted in the passing of the following resolution that the reps were asked to carry forward:

The North Central Region affirms the important initiative of the ACPE leadership in addressing the financial and governance issues facing the organization. This initiative should be continued with the leadership providing detailed clarification of the consequences of implementing such changes for finances, personnel, and structure of the organization. Such clarification would then be referred to the membership of each region for further discussion before any binding decisions are made.



Dr. Maureen Walker, a licensed psychologist with an independent practice in psychotherapy and multicultural consultation in Cambridge, MA; Director of Program Development at the Jean Baker Miller Training Institute of the Stone Center at Wellesley College; Associate Director in MBA Support Services at Harvard Business School; and author of the books How Connections Heal and The Complexity of Connection was our plenary speaker. Her topic was “Cultural Humility: from Conflict to Connection”. She helped us examine the implications and applications of relational practice for our work, identify barriers to relational practice, and provided tools whereby we can strategize and support each other to enact necessary change. Several theoretical underpinnings to her work:

- “People come to know themselves through action in relationship.”
- “A growth-fostering relationship is one in which all participants have an opportunity to grow.”
- “Growth requires encounters with difference...and with people embodying that difference. (Organisms do not grow by interacting with a mirror image of themselves..encounters with embodied difference is necessary.)
- “All power is created and sustained by relationship. Power is the capacity to induce responsiveness...to facilitate movement from point A to point B.”
- “Understanding how power and powerlessness work is key to the effectiveness of all human interventions.”
- “Conflict is inevitable...to ‘wage good conflict’ is to engage the possibility of creating something new.”





In keeping with our theme of celebration and creation of diversity, **Rev. Shawna Bowman**, visual artist, knit together our three worship services and an interactive time during our Monday evening banquet by creating the above painting over the course of our three days together. The painting became the property of the Region, and your regional board will be deciding what we will do with it. (One proposal is to auction it off to a member of the region and use the funds for future diversity education.)

In describing her work, Shawna writes:

“For someone like me, who’s mind runs furiously when I attempt to quiet it for prayer, painting for and with faith communities during worship offers me a solid connection to the community, a creative and embodied way of focusing, and allows a bit of space to open up in my head and heart for God’s presence to take root. When I paint for worshiping communities I am inviting those who worship to engage all of their senses and multiple intelligences in that act of worship and theological reflection.”

As an artist who makes “religious” images with and for faith communities I am interested in the interplay between what is sacred and what is secular; to ask questions about what is holy and what is profane. What is included in the story of who God is? And how does God continue to relate to God’s people? Not only through our biblical stories but also in our experiences of community as we worship, work and work out our faith and values in the world.

I believe I have a responsibility to make images of integrity that represent the theology and biblical understanding of the worshiping community for or with whom they are being created. Images in worship and in worship space, like a good sermon can open the Word that is being read, preached and proclaimed. It’s my hope that these images offer the viewer a fresh perspective and an opportunity to engage the divine with a new set of senses – like an icon these images can be windows to the Holy.”

Shawna did a summer intensive unit at Rush University Medical Center in Chicago several years ago and then came back and did a residency. She used the methods she shared with us in powerful and effective ways in her clinical settings and continues to do so in various venues in the Chicago area and throughout the country.



Mark M. Anderson receives the NCR Distinguished Service Award....



Mark Anderson has been in the North Central Region of ACPE for his entire career as a CPE Supervisor. He completed a Residency at Fairview Hospital from 1963 to 1966 under the supervision of **Gus Nelson**. Mark was first credentialed as a CPE Supervisor by the Lutheran Council in the United States of America (LCUSA) in 1965. He was among the initial CPE supervisors whose credentials were recognized in the formation of the ACPE in 1967. Prior to entering the fledgling CPE movement, Mark served as a parish pastor in California for four years (1959-63). When a colleague asked him forty-seven years ago about his career move toward CPE, Mark made the observation (perhaps with his trademark wry smile), "CPE supervisors seem to just have more fun." Mark has both lived out his own observation as well as made it possible for others also!

Regional Director, **Gary Sartain**, former student **Mary Altenbaumer**, colleague **Dick Sellers**, and Mark's daughter and sons all spoke about Mark's CPE career and its impact on their lives and the life of the NCR. It was pointed out how serendipitous it was to be honoring Mark at this particular juncture, since governance, regional and national interface, and reciprocity between ACPE and Norwegian CPE are all currently at the forefront. Mark had had a major impact on governance in 1976 when he, **Max Maguire** and several others were successful in getting the House of Delegates to back off their recommendations for change until the regions had opportunity to thoroughly study the proposal in order to instruct their delegates how to proceed from an informed position. And he is described as the "founding father behind the founding father" of Norwegian CPE (**Per Hoydal**), since he trained Per back in the late '60's and has helped the NCR remain a conduit for the training of Norwegian CPE Supervisors ever since.

Mark was also commended for his work on ACPE Standards. He chaired the NCR Standards Committee for many years and served as Chair of the ACPE Standards Committee for eight years. Establishing study committees and study documents that promulgated ideas from the "grass roots up" was a process he nurtured and enjoyed.

Mark's influence on hospitality—both at national ACPE gatherings and through the long-standing Minnesota north shore continuing education event (formerly the "13th Week" gathering) was also highlighted.

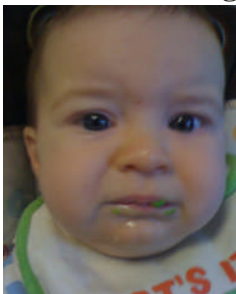

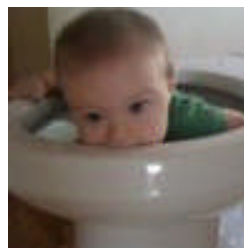

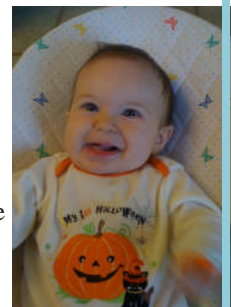

The Ideal Intervention Project and the Emerging Healthcare Delivery Remuneration Paradigm

One of the goals of the Ideal Intervention Project (IIP) is to eventually validate effective SC interventions by use of the Spiritual Care Knowledge Base (SCKB), and to thereby assure continued remuneration for SC professionals in the emerging health care reimbursement paradigm in which pay will be based upon achievement of effective desired outcomes. The changes pointing to the emergence of this new healthcare delivery remuneration paradigm are indicated as follows.

First, the *Affordable Care Act* will: in 2011 create the Independent Payment Advisory Board which will recommend ways to improve health outcomes for patients; in 2012 implement programs and controls that improve quality outcomes for patients and encourage more accountability among healthcare professionals; and in 2015 begin rewarding quality of care rather than amount of services in Medicare (1).

Second, US Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Director Donald Berwick, in redefining patient centered care, recognizes that this “will involve some radical, unfamiliar and disruptive shifts in control and power, out of the hands of those who give care and into the hands of those who receive it (2).”

Third, a report commissioned by the National Health Service (UK) concludes that “treatment should be evidence based... if a practice is not supported by evidence it is unlikely to be resourced... hospital chaplaincy finds itself in a political setting... value for money is part and parcel of how chaplains are judged... healthcare chaplains are being asked to show that what they do results in desired outcomes for those they work with... this requirement is linked to resource allocation... healthcare chaplaincy currently needs to identify its core tasks and skills and its place within a modern healthcare system... the distinction between religion and spirituality requires that health care chaplains are more robust in their approach to their evidence base... the secure future and positive potential for chaplaincy is linked to creating a better knowledge base about practice (3).” Other countries’ models will be examined. The UK implications are clear for US SC. (4)

Fourth, Education is among other disciplines caught up in this trend. For example, several states have now committed to using value-added analysis in teacher evaluation in order to secure financing from the Obama administration’s *Race to the Top* program (5).
